Closing A Successful COVID Unit

In December 2021, we experienced a COVID outbreak in Healthcare that led to our COVID Unit re-opening. In total, eight residents were diagnosed and treated for COVID-19 and spent approximately two weeks in our COVID Unit. While in COVID isolation precautions, each resident received continuous assessments, monitoring, and treatment for their symptoms related to COVID-19 infection.

We are pleased to share that all eight of our residents recovered from COVID-19. There is recognition that running the COVID Unit takes tremendous effort from all departments. The success of our COVID Unit would not have been possible without the diligence of our clinical providers and nursing team, commendable teamwork amongst all departments, support from our community, and the love and support from our residents and families.

My hopes for 2022 are to continue to provide support to our residents, their families and our team members, as we begin to see the light at the end of tunnel and return to a "normal" routine.


